
We were once again off to Bairnsdale for January camp. A Hawaiian-themed boat loading took place on the 4th of January, before the rowers drove up on the 5th. The Youth Men spent the majority of their sessions in the eight; learning to row sweep, building up fitness and preparing for racing. Excitingly, we also had two Junior Men at camp for the first time in recent years. The Youth Women, and Senior squads spent more time in small boats, getting some kilometres in the bank and improving their sculling and sweep skills.

On the 7th, a group raced in the inaugural 'Head of the Tambo', a 12km time trial organised by Bill Tait for the VIS, MUBC and Mercantile athletes who were training in the region. A special mention goes to visiting Swiss sculler, Nico Stahlberg, who posted the best prognostic time overall. Back in Bairnsdale, the Youth men and women where having fun with some battle paddling and sprint pieces in mixed eights.

Overall, camp was a huge success, and we look forward to seeing all the hard work come to fruition at the upcoming regattas. A special thank you to the coaches for all their hard work in organising and coaching the camp.

It is with great sadness that we inform you that Peter Philip, one of our longest serving club members, passed away on Tuesday 3rd January after a long illness. It didn't matter how Philpy was feeling he just kept on training and fighting on with that big infectious smile on his face.

PEML Philp, as he is noted in Australian and International record rowing records as both rower and coach of renown, was associated with MUBC as a coach and rower from 1973 onwards. In addition to his multi medal winning achievements as a coach, Philpy had a distinguished rowing career having represented Australia in the Men's Heavyweight Coxless 4 while a member of Mercantile Rowing Club.

Philpy came to MUBC in 1973 to coach the men's lightweight squad. MUBC crews had great success under his stewardship with all MUBC crews winning the Penrith Cup for Interstate Lightweight Fours in '73, '74, '75, '77, '78, and '79. Just like with his own rowing, Philpy charged his crews to take on the biggest challenges possible. Successes ranged from all domestic events in lightweight and heavyweight classes to a World Championship Gold medal win with an all MUBC crew in the Men's Lightweight 4 at the 1974 World Championships.

Of recent times, one of Philpy's wins was in the Masters Eight at the 2011 Head of the Charles Regatta. Peter noted this as one of his top achievements mainly due to it being another win – he had so many - but also because he had not been well for quite some time with cancer, I guess. For many of us it was his coaching that was his greatest achievement due to the benefits and successes this gave to so many of us. Philpy's "she'll be right" and "there's no fight too big" attitude changed the lives of so many of us. We are obliged to pass this on.

On behalf of all MUBC members we pass on our deepest condolences to Peter's wife Annette, son Alastair and sister Rosemary.

AUSTRALIAN UNIVERSITY GAMES CHAMPION LAKES, PERTH

With only 19 athletes (9 female rowers, 2 female coxswains and 8 male rowers) Melbourne University backed up last years winning form with an even more convincing performance in the University Games Rowing Regatta in Perth. One of only two universities that boated crews in every event, Melbourne University garnered a combined point score almost 100 points clear of the nearest university, our rivals to the North, the University of Sydney. Continuing the trend of recent years, the women's squad rowed their socks off to win five (almost six with a close second place to Ria Thompson in the women's heavyweight single) out of a possible seven events, resulting in a point score nearly double that of the women's squad of the next best performing Sydney Uni.

The Melbourne University men's squad fought valiantly; with British import James Goble battling through injury to allow the bare-bones squad to medal in the men's eight, a feat not achieved by a Melbourne University rowing team in a number of years. Other standout performances are Jordan Smith who, despite being over a head shorter than the eventual winner, convincingly won second in the men's heavyweight single, and the mixed eight who brought home some shiny gold medals, the first win for Melbourne University at the regatta.

It would be remiss of us not to once again thank Greg Longden and his trusty roadtrip accomplice for towing the boats across the Nullabor- and of course to the gang of boys that loaded themselves into the landcruiser on the voyage back.

A great week of racing and banter, and plenty of silverware to bring home to boot!

First off were the women, with Melbourne University dominating from the get-go. The rough water was no match for their steady rhythm as they batteld on and pulled away to an impressive victory of an indeterminable number of lengths.

The men's race fell in favour of the host crew with a stacked Sydney University crew proving too strong and eventually drawing the lead after an intense fight early on from the Melbourne boys. With conditions worsening, the winds served up a fine display of splash to add a surfboat-like theatric to the event.

At the conclusion of racing, the challenge was issued, and we look forward to hosting Sydney University later this year for a rematch.

The 2016 Head of the Yarra is a race I will never forget. I rowed in my 1st Senior 8+ in 2011 at the national championships. This was the race that taught me when you pull on a MUBC suit you become a part of something that is pretty special. We were the under-dogs and on paper you would easily write us off. With the help of the MUBC greats such as Kimmy, Pheebs (Stanley) and (Alice) Mac I learnt that you should never "write off" an MUBC crew. We became national champions in the W8+ and that was the last time MUBC has won the women's 8+. Over the last 6 years we have fronted up to every race with the passion but unfortunately never came through with the goods. I can remember chatting to Kimmy on the last night of Rio asking if she would come home for HOTY this year? Convincing her this is our year. For me this is where it started. Returning home, the whispers begin and we started to piece together the crew that would become 'the drought breakers'. Every session we took to the water with a clear intent of what we wanted to achieve; rhythm and together. Come race day we were ready to piece together the race we wanted. Starting second, we knew we would have our work cut out for us, but we stuck to our guns. While Mercs edged out about half a length in the 1st km it didn't take us long with our rhythm to edge our way back on them sitting in their wash for the kilometer leading into big bend. We knew we had to take the opportunity to take them on the bend and with Sarah Ben-David in total control of the boat and us, it's just what we did. Of course, special mention goes out to our bow siders to hook us around on the inside of Mercs. The race was won from 'Big Bend' and as we strode out the margin, it was all about enjoying the fact we rowing for our club and knowing that every single seat was giving it their all. Determined to keep pushing to the end.
